SPIRITUAL COMMUNION



WELCOME!

Welcome to Saint Cecilia Parish, a Roman Catholic community that gathers day by day, week by week, to know and make known the grace of God. By means of this abundant grace, we enjoy a diverse and close-knit parish family—young, old, rich, poor, of various ethnic origins and differing backgrounds. From our extraordinary music program to a growing children's faith formation program; from the various liturgical ministries to the many opportunities for social outreach that the parish provides, Saint Cecilia is a vibrant community of faith, centered on prayer and worship that tries to keep the Gospel close to heart and to live by Jesus' teachings.

Saint Cecilia Parish was established in 1888. At that time the Back Bay section of Boston along Commonwealth Avenue and Beacon Street was the residential section of the Yankee aristocracy. The maids ("Irish working out girls") and coachmen who served these residents had long requested a church of their own. When Archbishop Williams granted their request and carved the parish from the territory of the Cathedral, they built a magnificent church out of their meager earnings. Our church building resides on the ancestral homeland of the Pawtucket and Massachusett tribal nations.

The church was dedicated on April 22, 1894. Its architecture is Romanesque, XII Century Norman. The main altar, notable for its massive simplicity, was carved from a single block of white Carrara marble. The painting in the center reredos is a reproduction of da Vinci's The Last Supper, and the dome above is an array of 24K gold rosettes.

For the sixtieth anniversary celebration in 1954, a massive renovation project was undertaken. During this renovation, a statue of Pope Saint Pius X (canonized that same year) was imported from Italy and placed on the right side of the sanctuary. Above the statue are paintings from Pius' life. On the left side is a statue of Saint Patrick, principal patron of the Archdiocese of Boston, and above it are three scenes from his life.

Fourteen circular and sixteen square panels adorn the nave and arches of the church. The square panels are decorated with the symbols of Our Lady taken from the Litany of Loreto and the circular ones with symbols taken from the lives of the apostles. The great window of the Assumption—framed by the two oak cases of the organ—was installed in 1954 (the Marian Year) in spaces originally designed for windows but not until then used.

The original organ of 24 stops was built in 1902 by the Hutchings-Votey Organ Company, Opus 1465, and was rebuilt in 1954 with 32 stops. In 1998, Timothy Smith and Theodore Gilbert began a massive reconstruction of the organ. The current Smith & Gilbert Organ of 4 manuals, 54 ranks, and 3,084 pipes was dedicated on the Feast of Saint Cecilia, November 22, 1999.

Today we are experiencing something of an awakening within these old walls. Our numbers are increasing by 350 new households each year, and we continue to grow in our commitment to issues of peace, justice, and service to our neighbors, both near and far.

We've been right here on Belvidere Street, in the same building for over 125 years, but that does not mean that life here is stale, stagnant, or even predictable. We are proud to be entrusted with the legacy of Saint Cecilia Parish, where everything is the same, yet always changing; where we honor tradition while embracing the future; where God's love makes all things new.



- Every parish has been asked to host a clothing and toiletry drive during November.



We ask everyone to join these efforts through prayer, kind and compassionate outreach to those who are impacted by abuse, and full participation in our abuse prevention efforts. PROJECT HOPE Boston works in providing programs and family support solutions to alleviate poverty and homelessness.



Pine Street Inn

PINE STREET INN partners with homeless individuals to help them move from the streets and shelter to a home, and assists formerly homeless individuals in retaining housing. They provide street outreach, emergency services, supportive housing, job training, and connections to employment. Pine Street tirelessly advocates for collaborative solutions to end homelessness.



The Elders Living at Home Program at Boston Medical Center provides a range of services to a diverse group of older adults who are homeless, who have been homeless, and who may be at risk of becoming homeless. Their goal is to help these individuals maintain independence in safe, affordable permanent housing for as long as possible. The individuals served by ELAHP are very low-income, and many are socially isolated.



Haley House uses food with purpose and the power of community to break down barriers between people, empower individuals, and strengthen neighborhoods. They believe in radical solutions: solving problems at their root by challenging attitudes that perpetuate suffering and building alternative

WALTHAM HOUSE is a group home program run by the Home for Little Wanderers. It is designed to provide a supportive living environment for LGBTQ+ youth ages 14-18. Residents are offered a safe and nurturing environment, while they



the HOMELESS PROGRAM

The mission of Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program is to ensure unconditionally equitable and dignified access to the highest quality health care for all individuals and families experiencing homelessness in our community.



The LGBT Asylum Task Force provides shared housing for LGBTQ asylum seekers in Worcester, Massachusetts, small monthly stipends to pay for food, transportation, and other basic expenses, along with legal and medical resource lists.

The FAMILIES IN TRANSITION program at the Huntington Avenue YMCA is an emergency housing shelter for families. They provide services including advocacy, skills training, employment support, health and wellness opportunities, childcare provisions, and housing assistance to help families secure permanent housing.

SAINT CECILIA PARISH



Ann Marie Turo founded the Saint Cecilia Knitting and Crocheting Ministry in September 2019 as a way of giving back to our faith community in thanks for the support and prayers she received as she went through surgery, treatments, and eventual recovery from a rare form of cancer. In the first five months, a small but mighty band of knitters met in person at the church under Ann Marie's dedicated guidance...then COVID hit.

The group pivoted to virtual meetings, and continues now to meet virtually on the first Monday of each month from 3:30-4:30 p.m. The remote nature of the ministry has allowed people from all over the United States and Canada to join in, and many members of Saint Cecilia's Far-Flung Flock now participate in the ministry—either by knitting/crocheting for an organization local to them, or by sending their knitted items to Boston.

A meditative and prayerful practice, knitting and crocheting connects the members of this ministry with the love of mothers, aunts, grandmothers, family, and friends who taught them stitches, patterns, and more than a few life lessons. In a significant way, these fiber arts are an embodiment of the love and care passed between family members and friends. Each work holds and honors the memory of those who have gone before and warms and comforts those who are with us



now. In members' homes you will find many works in progress (WIP), bags of projects soon to be on knitting needles crochet and/or hooks, and bags of what knitters call STASH (Special Treasures Secretly Hidden). As each stich loops and binds the project together, inching it toward completion, too are the many

prayers offered in its making bound together as an offering to the recipient.

"Joining with other knitters each month feeds my spirit," writes one ministry member. "Sharing this ministry with women not only from Boston, but from Maine to San Jose, across the United States, and into Canada gives me a lift! We begin and end our time together in prayer, and in between we share ideas and encourage one another."

Another parishioner says that after reading Tracey Kidder's book, *Rough Sleepers*, she was inspired to help Boston's homeless community, and knits headbands to keep rough sleepers warm on frigid Boston nights. As she knits, she connects "though prayer and presence with those who spend their nights on the street."

The work of the Saint Cecilia Knitting and Crocheting Ministry is felt throughout the Greater Boston area—warming the heads, hands, feet, and hearts of our neighbors in need. Over the years, the ministry's reach has grown tremendously. Currently, our knitters and crocheters create prayer shawls, prayer book markers, and prayer pillows for Brigham and Women's Hospital, scarfs and cowls for Women's Lunch Place, and baby blankets, hats, and booties that are distributed at the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Boston Medical Center.

This ministry has gathered for the past two falls to provide knit and crocheted pumpkins. In 2022, it was to celebrate Father John's return from sabbatical, and this past month, they welcomed the Far-Flung Flock for their weekendlong retreat. Beyond these concerted efforts to welcome and celebrate our community members, the Knitting and Crocheting Ministry creates upon request for parishioners facing challenges and for the Greater Boston Knitting Guild. The energy and love of this ministry's work is palpable—one recipient of a prayer shawl raised a corner, and with tears in her eyes said, "There are a thousand tiny knots in this shawl and each one holds a prayer."

In many ways, the members of this ministry have carefully crafted a community that not only grows together in faith but is drawn together by the mission of serving others through their art. Ministering a step beyond the usual limelight of social media posts and parish bulletin entries, the work of Ann Marie and other members of our Knitting and Crocheting Ministry touches the lives of so many, and so it is our (the parish staff's) pleasure to share about their work. Child Abuse Prevention (CAP) Team

The CAP Team is responsible for training all parish staff and volunteers in mandated reporting laws and the Protecting God's Children program (VIRTUS). They provide consultation and support to anyone who has concerns about reporting child abuse and neglect. The Archdiocese of Boston has in place a vigorous program to protect children from harm and to educate its ministers and faithful about the nature of abuse, with a goal of increasing knowledge, creating a safe environment for children, and recognizing and reporting potentially dangerous situations. The full policy is available in the narthex, Parish Office, and on our website.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the communal process through which non-baptized men and women become members of the Catholic Church. It is also suitable for those baptized in different faith traditions who are interested in becoming Catholic, or, for those who were baptized Catholic, but have yet to receive the sacraments of Eucharist and confirmation.

Marriage

Couples who wish to prepare for marriage should contact Mark Donohoe in the Parish Office at least six months in advance.

Care of the Sick

To arrange for the Sacrament of the Sick, for Holy Communion to be brought to those unable to attend the Sunday celebration, or for Viaticum for the Dying (Holy Communion for those in danger of death), please contact the Parish Office. It is always possible to anoint the sick during regularly scheduled liturgies.

Order of Christian Funerals

The parish is prepared to celebrate the Vigil (wake) in the church. Please contact the Parish Office for more information.
