SPIRITUAL COMMUNION







WELCOME!

Welcome to Saint Cecilia Parish, a Roman Catholic community that gathers day by day, week by week, to know and make known the grace of God. By means of this abundant grace, we enjoy a diverse and close-knit parish family—young, old, rich, poor, of various ethnic origins and differing backgrounds. From our extraordinary music program to a growing children's faith formation program; from the various liturgical ministries to the many opportunities for social outreach that the parish provides, Saint Cecilia is a vibrant community of faith, centered on prayer and worship that tries to keep the Gospel close to heart and to live by Jesus' teachings.

Saint Cecilia Parish was established in 1888. At that time the Back Bay section of Boston along Commonwealth Avenue and Beacon Street was the residential section of the Yankee aristocracy. The maids ("Irish working out girls") and coachmen who served these residents had long requested a church of their own. When Archbishop Williams granted their request and carved the parish from the territory of the Cathedral, they built a magnificent church out of their meager earnings. Our church building resides on the ancestral homeland of the Pawtucket and Massachusett tribal nations.

The church was dedicated on April 22, 1894. Its architecture is Romanesque, XII Century Norman. The main altar, notable for its massive simplicity, was carved from a single block of white Carrara marble. The painting in the center reredos is a reproduction of da Vinci's The Last Supper, and the dome above is an array of 24K gold rosettes.


For the sixtieth anniversary celebration in 1954, a massive renovation project was undertaken. During this renovation, a statue of Pope Saint Pius X (canonized that same year) was imported from Italy and placed on the right side of the sanctuary. Above the statue are paintings from Pius' life. On the left side is a statue of Saint Patrick, principal patron of the Archdiocese of Boston, and above it are three scenes from his life.

Fourteen circular and sixteen square panels adorn the nave and arches of the church. The square panels are decorated with the symbols of Our Lady taken from the Litany of Loreto and the circular ones with symbols taken from the lives of the apostles. The great window of the Assumption—framed by the two oak cases of the organ—was installed in 1954 (the Marian Year) in spaces originally designed for windows but not until then used.

The original organ of 24 stops was built in 1902 by the Hutchings-Votey Organ Company, Opus 1465, and was rebuilt in 1954 with 32 stops. In 1998, Timothy Smith and Theodore Gilbert began a massive reconstruction of the organ. The current Smith & Gilbert Organ of 4 manuals, 54 ranks, and 3,084 pipes was dedicated on the Feast of Saint Cecilia, November 22, 1999.

Today we are experiencing something of an awakening within these old walls. Our numbers are increasing by 350 new households each year, and we continue to grow in our commitment to issues of peace, justice, and service to our neighbors, both near and far.

We've been right here on Belvidere Street, in the same building for over 125 years, but that does not mean that life here is stale, stagnant, or even predictable. We are proud to be entrusted with the legacy of Saint Cecilia Parish, where everything is the same, yet always changing; where we honor tradition while embracing the future; where God's love makes all things new.



Gaudete in Domino semper: iterum dico, gaudete. Dominus enim prope est.

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near.



We are now midway through Advent and today is a day of rejoicing, traditionally called "Gaudete Sunday" (gow–DAY–tay). "Gaudete" is Latin for "rejoice" and this title is taken from the first word of the Introit (entrance antiphon) for the Third Sunday of Advent. Before we started singing hymns in English, the Introit was normally chanted in Latin as the priest approached the altar. It helped to set the mood and theme of the Mass of the day. The Introit for the Third Sunday of Advent comes from Philippians 4, Paul's warm and loving letter to the community at Philippi. The optional use of rose–colored vestments underscores the joyful character of today's liturgy.

Gaudete Sunday dates back to the Middle Ages, when the season of Advent bore a penitential character similar to that of Lent. At that time, Advent was a forty–day period of fasting and penance in preparation for Christmas. It commenced on the day after Saint Martin's Day (12 November) and was thus often referred to as "St. Martin's Lent." In the midst of a dark and serious Advent, Gaudete Sunday helped to brighten the mood. In the ninth century, Advent was reduced to four weeks and its austere character gave way to a new understanding of Advent as a time of longing, hoping, and waiting for the Lord.

DONATIONS FOR DORCHESTER FOOD PANTRIES

Please consider participating in our food donation ministry during the upcoming months so that the volume of our donated food remains strong. The local economy might have improved for some of us, but the working poor and unemployed continue to face enormous economic challenges—especially in light of rising food prices. Saint Cecilia has committed to providing these items to food pantries: Cheerios or cornflakes, peanut butter, white flour pasta and spaghetti, macaroni and cheese, canned tuna fish, canned chicken breast, cooking oil, and tomato sauce. While any canned or shelf-stable items are appreciated, it is particularly helpful when parishioners can help with the staples listed above. Unfortunately, we cannot accept donations of baked items or produce in the narthex.

SAINT CECILIA ADVENT GIVING TREE

Each year, before Christmas, we consolidate requests for assistance from local agencies serving our neighbors in need into one program—the Saint Cecilia Advent Giving Tree. This year, the tags on the trees are from the agencies that reached out to us. Parishioners may take one or more tags from the tree and return the gifts to the parish for delivery. Thank you for your generosity—it helps bring tidings of comfort and joy to many people in our neighborhood.





HERE'S WHAT TO DO

- Select one or more tags and purchase the item(s).
- Please do not take a tag unless you know you will be able to purchase the gift.
- Wrap the gift UNLESS the tag says, "DO NOT WRAP." If you do not have time to wrap—that's OK! We have a gift wrap team!

- You are welcome to add to your purchase, e.g., if someone requested a winter hat, you add gloves or a scarf, holiday candy, etc. Remember—for some people, this will be the only gift they receive for Christmas.

- If the gift is too expensive or if you change your mind, simply return the tag to a Giving Tree Coordinator.

PROJECT H PE BOSTON

PROJECT HOPE Boston works in partnership with women and families in the Dorchester and Roxbury neighborhoods of Boston on their journeys up and out of poverty. They do this by being a catalyst for change in the lives of families, developing and providing programs and family support solutions to alleviate poverty and homelessness.

Pine Street Inn

PINE STREET INN partners with homeless individuals to help them move from the streets and shelter to a home, and assists formerly homeless individuals in retaining housing. They provide street outreach, emergency services, supportive housing, job training, and connections to employment. Pine Street tirelessly advocates for collaborative solutions to end homelessness.

The Elders Living at Home Program at Boston Medical Center provides a range of services to a diverse group of older adults who are homeless, who have been homeless, and who may be at risk of becoming homeless. Their goal is to help these individuals maintain independence in safe, affordable permanent housing for as long as possible. The individuals served by ELAHP are very low-income, and many are socially isolated.

MALEY HOUSE

Haley House uses food with purpose and the power of community to break down barriers between people, empower individuals, and strengthen neighborhoods. They believe in radical solutions: solving problems at their root by challenging attitudes that perpetuate suffering and building alternative models.

THE H ME

WALTHAM HOUSE is a group home program run by the Home for Little Wanderers. It is designed to provide a supportive living environment for LGBTQ+ youth ages 14-18. Residents are offered a safe and nurturing environment, while they prepare for family reunification, independent living, and future self-sufficiency.

BOSTON HEALTH CARE for the HOMELESS PROGRAM

The mission of Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program is to ensure unconditionally equitable and dignified access to the highest quality health care for all individuals and families experiencing homelessness in our community.

LGBT ASYLUM

The LGBT Asylum Task Force provides shared housing for LGBTQ asylum seekers in Worcester, Massachusetts, small monthly stipends to pay for food, transportation, and other basic expenses, along with legal and medical resource lists.

The FAMILIES IN TRANSITION program at the Huntington Avenue YMCA is an emergency housing shelter for families. They provide services including advocacy, skills training, employment support, health and wellness opportunities, childcare provisions, and housing assistance to help families secure permanent housing.

Catholic Charities

The Catholic Charities Yawkey Child Care Center, is a diverse center-based community dedicated to providing a nurturing, safe, clean, healthy environment where children can grow and develop socially, emotionally, and cognitively. LAS POSADAS: A MEXICAN TRADITION KEEPS CHRIST (AND MARY AND JOSEPH) IN CHRISTMAS BY J.D. LONG-GARCÍA

Mary and Joseph were running just a couple of minutes late yesterday afternoon. Children, parents and grandparents of many families gathered on 125th Avenue in front of one of their neighbor's homes to celebrate Las Posadas.

"This is a tradition that we've celebrated since we were children in Mexico," said Maria Ramirez, one of the coordinators of Las Posadas for St. John Vianney Church in Goodyear, Arizona.

"It brings the barrio together. Almost everyone in the neighborhood participates," she said, noting most participants immigrated from Mexico. "This is something we want to hand down to our children."

Las Posadas, literally "the inns," is a reenactment of the Holy Family's search for lodging in Bethlehem before the birth of Christ. Typically, two children will play the role of Mary and Joseph, a few others will play innkeepers and the rest will accompany the group as they process from one house to the next. If children take the roles, participants will carry statues of Mary and Joseph for the reenactment.

But yesterday, Breyda Navarro-Vargas, 12, played Mary.

"I'm honored to do this for my family," she said as she adjusted her blue mantle. "Most of my cousins are embarrassed. But I'm down with it. I'm proud of my faith."

Breyda has played Mary before. She said that participating in Las Posadas helps her understand what the Blessed Mother went through before giving birth to Jesus. Bernye Santillán, 11, who played St. Joseph, did not offer much in response to questions. Perhaps that is because he was in character.

The St. John Vianney group prayed decades of the rosary, meditating on the Luminous Mysteries, before breaking out into the traditional songs of Las Posadas at each house. The three stops of the reenactment were relatively close to each other, so the procession of about 50 walked slowly.

During the reenactments, the group outside asks for lodging, or "posada," and the group inside rejects them at each stop. Until, of course, the reenactment arrives at the final house where Mary and Joseph are welcomed inside. All the same songs are sung, back and forth, but then the group playing the innkeepers sing lines: "Wait, it is you Joseph, and your wife, Mary! Please come in, I did not recognize you!" To this, the group outside sings, "God will repay you for your charity and fill you with blessings in heaven." Once the pilgrims are welcomed, the celebration truly begins.

"We are experts at celebrating," Cristofer Pereyra, director of the Hispanic Mission Office of the Diocese of Phoenix, said of the Latino community.

Las Posadas celebrations will typically include Mexican sweet bread, a hot chocolate drink called *champurrado* and *menudo*. At the Goodyear celebration yesterday, they shared *pozole*, a traditional Mexican stew, along with hot chocolate and nachos, which are admittedly not traditional.

"You know, not all the children like pozole," said Ms. Ramirez, stressing the need to involve the next generation. "Kids don't always like spicy foods, so we have nachos."

During evening celebrations, participants often carry candles. "The children love that. It's the one chance they have to play with fire every year," Mr. Pereyra quipped.

Las Posadas, with its series of chants and prayers, is a tradition that is clearly Christian. It reminds believers that the very first Christmas was a humble one, Mr. Pereyra said, and it was not about the amount of money spent.

"Christmas is about receiving God made flesh. Las Posadas is a path away from the commercialization of Christmas," he said, adding that it could be celebrated by various cultures. "I wouldn't be surprised if we start seeing Las Posadas celebrated in the English-language."

Maria Muñoz-Visoso, executive director for U.S bishops' Secretariat for Cultural Diversity in the Church, has experienced people "from all over the world" celebrating Las Posadas at her parish, St. Camillus in Silver Spring, Md. The story connects with people on the move.

"Mary was very much pregnant, but she and Joseph were

forced to make this journey because of the census. Joseph had to return to his birthplace to get registered," she said. "The inn is full, no one is welcoming them, even in Mary's state."

But someone finally does take pity on them and allows them to stay, albeit with the animals. They stay for a time, receive visitors, but then have to flee persecution.

"For us, Las Posadas is a journey of faith," Ms. Muñoz-Visoso said. "Mary, Joseph and Jesus are trying to find a place in our heart. Are we open to them?"

Yet for migrants and refugees fleeing violence, Las Posadas is their life, she said. They are forced to leave circumstances of dire poverty, war, gang violence and extortion to find a safe place for their families. Migrants and refugees identify with the Holy Family through Las Posadas.

"They know what it is to be persecuted for no fault of their own. And they also know the journey is about protecting life," Ms. Muñoz-Visoso said. "When Mary and Joseph flee, they are protecting their most precious gift, the child Jesus. They do whatever it takes to protect him."

In Goodyear, traditional Mexican dancers, called matachines, joined the celebration at the final house. Matachines dance in honor of Our Lady of Guadalupe. After the dancing, Breyda Navarro-Vargas, who played Mary, climbed on top the roof to swing the piñata.

Children lined up, smallest to biggest, with a decorated wooden stick. The time allowed for each child shrank in proportion to their size. The parents wanted all the children to get a swing.

"We have families from all over the neighborhood who are welcomed at our homes," said Baltazar Ramírez, who co-hosted the celebration with his wife, María. "We come together, as brothers and sisters, like a family. We eat together...we eat tamales. It's where differences disappear. Jesus sees us all the same."

And with any luck, more people will join the celebration in the United States.


"This is a way of evangelizing people. It really is a witness," Ms. Muñoz-Visoso said. "People go through the streets. They're singing about Jesus' birth and Jesus' coming. It's a witness of faith."

It is also suitable for those baptized in different faith traditions who are interested in becoming Catholic, or, for those who were baptized Catholic, but have yet to receive the sacraments of Eucharist and confirmation.
