SPIRITUAL COMMUNION



WELCOME!

Welcome to Saint Cecilia Parish, a Roman Catholic community that gathers day by day, week by week, to know and make known the grace of God. By means of this abundant grace, we enjoy a diverse and close-knit parish family—young, old, rich, poor, of various ethnic origins and differing backgrounds. From our extraordinary music program to a growing children's faith formation program; from the various liturgical ministries to the many opportunities for social outreach that the parish provides, Saint Cecilia is a vibrant community of faith, centered on prayer and worship that tries to keep the Gospel close to heart and to live by Jesus' teachings.

Saint Cecilia Parish was established in 1888. At that time the Back Bay section of Boston along Commonwealth Avenue and Beacon Street was the residential section of the Yankee aristocracy. The maids ("Irish working out girls") and coachmen who served these residents had long requested a church of their own. When Archbishop Williams granted their request and carved the parish from the territory of the Cathedral, they built a magnificent church out of their meager earnings. Our church building resides on the ancestral homeland of the Pawtucket and Massachusett tribal nations.

The church was dedicated on April 22, 1894. Its architecture is Romanesque, XII Century Norman. The main altar, notable for its massive simplicity, was carved from a single block of white Carrara marble. The painting in the center reredos is a reproduction of da Vinci's The Last Supper, and the dome above is an array of 24K gold rosettes.

For the sixtieth anniversary celebration in 1954, a massive renovation project was undertaken. During this renovation, a statue of Pope Saint Pius X (canonized that same year) was imported from Italy and placed on the right side of the sanctuary. Above the statue are paintings from Pius' life. On the left side is a statue of Saint Patrick, principal patron of the Archdiocese of Boston, and above it are three scenes from his life.


Fourteen circular and sixteen square panels adorn the nave and arches of the church. The square panels are decorated with the symbols of Our Lady taken from the Litany of Loreto and the circular ones with symbols taken from the lives of the apostles. The great window of the Assumption—framed by the two oak cases of the organ—was installed in 1954 (the Marian Year) in spaces originally designed for windows but not until then used.

The original organ of 24 stops was built in 1902 by the Hutchings-Votey Organ Company, Opus 1465, and was rebuilt in 1954 with 32 stops. In 1998, Timothy Smith and Theodore Gilbert began a massive reconstruction of the organ. The current Smith & Gilbert Organ of 4 manuals, 54 ranks, and 3,084 pipes was dedicated on the Feast of Saint Cecilia, November 22, 1999.

Today we are experiencing something of an awakening within these old walls. Our numbers are increasing by 350 new households each year, and we continue to grow in our commitment to issues of peace, justice, and service to our neighbors, both near and far.

We've been right here on Belvidere Street, in the same building for over 125 years, but that does not mean that life here is stale, stagnant, or even predictable. We are proud to be entrusted with the legacy of Saint Cecilia Parish, where everything is the same, yet always changing; where we honor tradition while embracing the future; where God's love makes all things new.



A WAY TO HELP THE CHILDREN AT CATHOLIC CHARITIES INN

Our friends at Catholic Charities provide temporary, supportive housing for families working to get back on their feet and under their own roof. Each program is staffed 24/7 with qualified and trained workers to help provide safety and consistency to families and/or individuals.

Under the direction of Vice President of Basic Needs, Beth Chambers, case managers assess the needs of the guests and together they determine the best path to rebuild, strengthen their families, and move toward self-sufficiency. Catholic Charities Inn and Safety-Net Shelters opened in Brighton in 2023 in response to the growing humanitarian crisis facing families experiencing homelessness in Massachusetts. Residents are referred directly through the state's emergency shelter system.

PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN

VIRTUS is the umbrella term for a two-part training designed to keep children safe in the parish setting. The Archdiocese requires this two-part training of all volunteers and staff who have the potential for direct contact with children or the vulnerable due to their involvement in the parish. The first part, Protecting God's Children (or PGC), is a training on how to recognize the signs and symptoms that a child is being abused and how to talk with children about these issues. The second part is a mandated reporter training. All parish staff and volunteers are mandated reporters and are required to attend this one-time training. If you intend to volunteer in the future and haven't attended this training before, please join us. Please note that both parts will be covered in Sunday's session and the training will be approximately 3 hours, including videos and group discussion. SAINT CECILIA PARISH



Each of today's readings deal in their own ways with the theme of mutual fidelity between God and God's people. In the first reading, the leaders of the twelve tribes of Israel make a choice to be faithful to the Lord, as they remember God's liberating power and faithfulness to them. The psalmist proclaims glory for the Lord who rescues and watches over the bones of the just, saves the brokenhearted, and destroys evildoers. Even the second reading presents a vision of a kind of mutual fidelity: "Brothers and sisters: Be subordinate to one another out of reverence for Christ." In the Gospel, while many desert Jesus, finding his teachings too hard, too bizarre, the disciples stay by Jesus' side, sensing his faithfulness to them, as they declare—"You have the words of eternal life".

I recently had the chance to reflect on my own experience of God's faithfulness during an eight-day silent retreat. Our retreat leader led us in an opening guided meditation. Let's go there now.

Close your eyes and imagine that you're in the midst of a bustling crowd on the shores of the Sea of Galilee. Of all the many people gathered there, Jesus locks eyes with you, walks straight up to you, and asks you, "What is that you ask of me?"

What do you tell him? What is that you ask of Jesus?

For my own part, I was caught off guard by what welled up inside of me in response to Jesus' question. As he gazed on me with eyes of love, his hand outstretched, what I felt was a flash of anger, and the words that came to me were, "I want you to be my *ally*."

In the days before I entered my retreat, Pope Francis' interview on 60 Minutes had aired in which he had said that a little girl growing up in the Church today couldn't dream of one day being ordained a deacon. While a primetime TV interview is by no means official church

teaching, his comments still stung. What of the ongoing global synod process that *he* initiated, which includes a study group that *he* convened, tasked with looking into the question of women's ordination as permanent deacons? Has he already made up his mind before the consultative process had reached its conclusion? Is this the one issue that synodality doesn't apply to? Furthermore, he denied the well-established history of women's ordination as deacons in the past, even while recognizing that women are indeed serving diaconal functions in the church today without the grace of ordination. What gives? While women have been serving God in the Church faithfully for generations, it does not seem like we are receiving the same faithfulness and respect from the Church.

The process of synodality has invited us to reflect and discern about women's roles and equal dignity. At the conclusion of the first phase of the synod a little over a year ago, the Document on the Continental Stage stated that women everywhere are asking the Church to be their ally in every part of life. And it's certainly consistent with Catholic social teaching that the Church should be an ally to women, who are, to varying degrees, systematically marginalized, excluded from public life, subjected to sexual violence and all forms of abuse, more likely to live in poverty with its many related vulnerabilities. If we proclaim, with the words of our Psalm, a preferential option for the poor and vulnerable, we certainly must include women under that umbrella. We must believe and live as though God is close to the broken hearted.

And yet, as I entered my retreat, my experience of the Church in relationship to my embodiment as a woman was far from one of allyship. And what I realized with that flash of anger as I encountered Jesus by the Sea of Galilee was that the Church's failure to be an ally to women had undermined my ability to see Jesus himself as my ally. It seemed God wanted to use those eight days to change that.

We need look no further than today's second reading

SAINT CECILIA PARISH

and the many ways it has been deployed by Christians throughout history for reasons women might doubt the Church's allyship. "Wives should be obedient to their husbands as to the Lord. For the husband is head of his wife just as Christ is head of the church." I've heard plenty of interpretative gymnastics that seek to liberate this text—that it's remarkable that Paul is addressing women at all; that the passage is about mutual submission; that perhaps Paul is speaking to a very specific situation in Ephesus, and not to women generally.

But perhaps more germane to today's reflection than the original intent of the author is how these lines have been interpreted and used by Christians to harm women. Throughout history and continuing today, these words about wives' obedience have been used to silence women, to keep us in abusive marriages, to justify our oppression. Whatever our efforts to understand and contextualize this passage, it is a text that confronts us. When we reflect on the Scriptures, we must ask: do we find that the good news we are proclaiming is in fact good news for everyone—especially the poor and vulnerable? If not, we should perhaps revisit our reflection.

When I, a woman, read today's readings, am I to hear God's promises of fidelity as being directed at me? Is God close to my brokenheartedness? What about when it arises from the particularity of my experience as a woman? Does Jesus have the words of eternal life for me as well as for my brothers?

Despite a history of undermining itself on the point, our Tradition says that, yes, I, too, am saved by God. God is *my* ally, not in spite of my particular chromosomal composition and society's response to it but in fact *because* of it. I am reminded of this when I look to the women who followed Jesus. Would they have bankrolled his missions, hosted his parties, washed his feet with their hair, and stayed by his side in moments of great peril if his good news had not pertained to them? Would they have been his ally if he had not been theirs? The fidelity was mutual.

Women have been faithful to the Church, at times at great cost, even when the rhetoric of the Church has been used to push us aside and harm us. Our fidelity has not always been met with mutuality. When the Church's failures to honor my dignity threaten to undermine my sense of God's fidelity to me, as they did on that first day of my retreat, I look to the women who followed and continue to follow Jesus. They—you who are listening now—have been leading me back into trust that the fullness of God's promises pertain to me. We do that for one another.

The good news of today's readings is that Jesus' words of eternal life *are* for all of us. Some will choose to stay by his side while others will walk away sad, but his allyship does not discriminate. His invitation is to a relationship of mutual fidelity. As Church, we want to reflect and proclaim an invitation to all into a relationship of mutual fidelity with God. The invitation for those of us with teaching and decision making authority in the Church—which, in a synodal church that welcomes the co-responsibility of all the baptized is increasingly all of us—is to interrogate our sense of the good news and to listen when someone tells us that our way of sharing it is *not* good news for them. In the global synod, the Church has taken the incredible step of beginning to listen to women. The next step is to believe us. I think Jesus would have.

Child Abuse Prevention (CAP) Team

The CAP Team is responsible for training all parish staff and volunteers in mandated reporting laws and the Protecting God's Children program (VIRTUS). They provide consultation and support to anyone who has concerns about reporting child abuse and neglect. The Archdiocese of Boston has in place a vigorous program to protect children from harm and to educate its ministers and faithful about the nature of abuse, with a goal of increasing knowledge, creating a safe environment for children, and recognizing and reporting potentially dangerous situations. Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

This is the communal process through which non-baptized men and women become members of the Catholic Church. It is also suitable for those baptized in different faith traditions who are interested in becoming Catholic, or, for those who were baptized Catholic, but have yet to receive the sacraments of Eucharist and confirmation.

Marriage

Couples who wish to prepare for marriage should contact Mark Donohoe in the Parish Office at least six months in advance.

Care of the Sick

To arrange for the Sacrament of the Sick, for Holy Communion to be brought to those unable to attend the Sunday celebration, or for Viaticum for the Dying (Holy Communion for those in danger of death), please contact the Parish Office. It is always possible to anoint the sick during regularly scheduled liturgies.

Order of Christian Funerals
